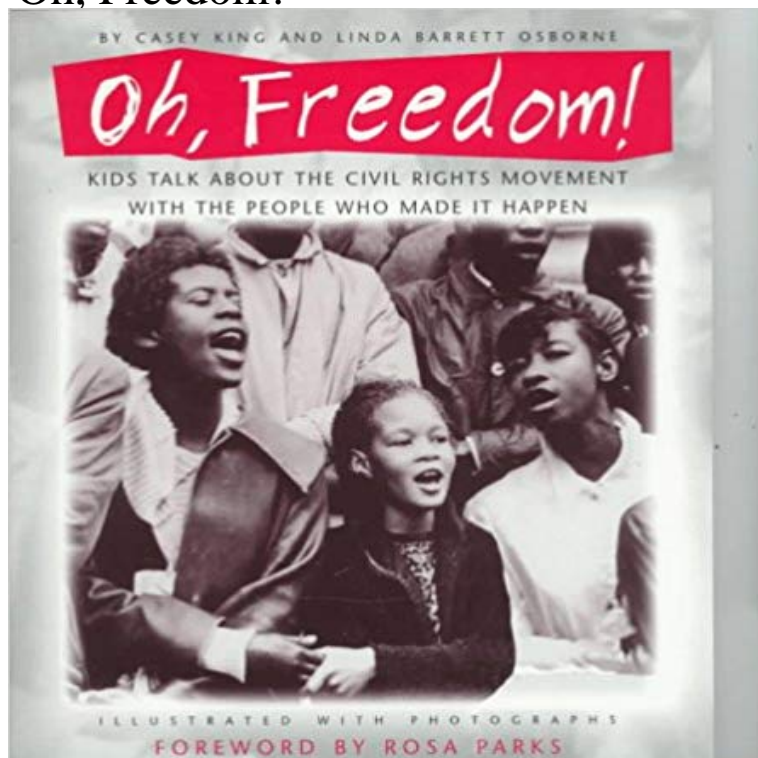


Oh, Freedom!
